

## Laura Jones, 8 years of supporting the Verde River!

When I moved to Clarkdale in 2006, I joked to my friends that I couldn't find the Verde River. Fast forward to 2011, and I became a volunteer with Friends, a group dedicated to preserving the very river that five years earlier I couldn't find.

First, I joined a group known as Marsha's Dirty Dozen, and removed invasive Tree of Heaven at Dead Horse Ranch State Park. Next, I volunteered with the Verde Watershed Restoration Coalition (VWRC) presenting at community meetings and developing workshops to show landowners how to remove Arundo donax (Giant Reed) from their property.

As luck would have it, in July 2012 an outreach coordinator position became open, and I would become part of the team that would take Friends from a volunteer organization, to a professional one.



Over these last 8 years, I learned to love the river and the value that it brings to our community. People say to me, "well you're a river person." The truth is that I am an administrator and community engagement professional that happened to fall in love with a river. I have worked in many fields over the years, scientific publishing, higher education, and HIV/AIDS services: until Friends I had never been involved with an environmental cause. #### **Celebrating Trees**

The power of water is often unstoppable. After days of steady rain, the saturated ground of the Verde Valley could not hold any more, and the river began to rise. The high water swallowed the banks, and washed out a bridge that the conservation crew of military Veterans were using to access habitat on the opposite bank.

In many places along the Verde, the natural habitat and beauty offered by the Cottonwood-Willow gallery forest is crowded with thirsty invasive species. This year, even the destruction of an important bridge on the Trust for Public Lands property couldn't keep these dedicated Veterans from completing their goal of removing these stubborn plants.

The crew was able to complete 1,000 hours of restoration work on the confluence of Beaver Creek and the Verde River. They made their way through the flowing water on foot with all of their gear on their backs. By removing 362 mature

Tamarisk trees, and opened the way for replanting efforts. Thanks to the help of 21 volunteers from multiple groups, 87 Willow branch poles were planted, with many on their way to becoming adult Willow trees. These Willows make ideal habitat for a variety of native Birds, like the Southwestern Willow Flycatcher.

The crew also planted 20 new cottonwood trees, using a method that increases their chances of survival. After completing the project, the crew saluted the trees with a yoga tree pose.

Steve Ayers, Camp Verde's Economic Development Director, volunteered on Martin Luther King Jr. Day to help plant the new Willows. "I like digging holes," laughed Ayers, "It is great to see that section of Beaver Creek and the Verde get some conservation work done. I think it is great to get people involved with the river."

#### Run the Verde Raffle!


